PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

COVID-19



As we go to press 2019-nCoV (Coronavirus) has an official name: COVID-19. The World Health Organization (WHO) released the name on February 11, 2020. This virus is an ever-changing medical story. The death toll continues to rise daily. As medical

professionals we all need to be informed with the latest information. The CDC web site https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/index.html) is updated as new information emerges.

This site includes links about Evaluating and Reporting Persons Under Investigation (PUI), COVID-19 Situation Summary, Information for travelers, Information for Businesses, Healthcare Professionals-including a flowchart, Pubic Health Professionals and Laboratories.

As of 11:00 A.M. ET February 12, 2020 there are no confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Georgia. There are 15 confirmed cases in 7 states: Washington, California, Arizona, Wisconsin, Illinois, Massachusetts and Texas. Worldwide, 28 countries have confirmed cases, including Canada, Russia, India and Australia.

Symptoms of COVID-19 include fever, cough and Shortness of breath. These may appear 2-14 days after exposure. The first cases were detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China in December 2019. They began at a seafood and live animal market, suggesting animal-to-person spread. Later, a growing number of patients reportedly did not have exposure to animal markets indicating personto-person spread.

Dr Li Wenliang, a 33-year-old Chinese ophthalmologist based in Wuhan City is credited with issuing early warning of person-to person spread, died Friday, February 7, 2020 after contracting the virus. In several interviews with Chinese media while he was hospitalized, Dr Li described how be believed he was infected with the COVID-19 virus while examining a female patient for glaucoma in the second week of January. She had developed a fever, LRI symptoms and a CT scan showed an unknown virus in her lung. Two of her family members were also sick. He reported this obvious person-to-person spread to his hospital officials. A few days later Dr. Li developed a cough and fever and checked himself into a hotel, concerned that his young child and pregnant wife would be infected. CT scan confirmed he too was infected with the virus. Afterwards he was hospitalized and quarantined on January 12. Around this same time, he learned that his parents and some medical colleagues were infected as well. Dr Li wondered on social media why the official Chinese announcements were still saying there had been no transmissions between humans and medical staff.

Risk factors include being male, elderly, smoking, diabetes and hypertension. Two


thirds of the infected cases in China are male to 1/3 female.

Travel procedures for people arriving the United States from China are as follows: Foreign nationals who have visited China in the past 14 days may not enter the U.S. American citizens, lawful permanent residents, and their families who have been in China in the past 14 days will be redirected to one of 11 airports where the CDC has quarantine stations. Depending on your health and travel history you will have restrictions on your movement for 14 days.

Let us all continue to follow this unfolding medical story in the coming days and weeks ahead.

Piedmont Columbus Regional Hosts Trauma Symposium


Piedmont Columbus Regional recently hosted the Regional Trauma Advisory Committees Region VII Trauma Symposium and Skills Lab at our Midtown Campus, which is home to the area's only Level II Trauma Center with a helipad.

Nearly 200 first responders and clinicians from the Chattahoochee Valley area listened to lectures and participated in hands-on training ranging from how to stop the bleed, properly applying tourniquets, how to respond to various types of trauma and treat burns and concussions. Participants were also able to learn proper chest needle decompression and also trained with cadavers in the skills procedure lab.

HUGHSTON CLINIC NEWS

Etowah High School Visits the Hughston Foundation

Students from Etowah High School, Woodstock, Georgia, visited The Hughston Foundation for a full-day STEAM program. Megan King, a former Hughston ATC Fellow, traveled more than 2 hours with 30 of her health science students to participate in the event.



The students began their morning session with an introduction by Belinda Klein, executive director, and a video about the Foundation. Afterwards, they were split into groups and began 20-minute rotations between these 5 STEAM stations: Science: The students participated in a casting demonstration which emphasized how science and chemicals are used in medicine.

Technology: In the Surgical Education Center, the students received basic surgical training and hands-on practice using an arthroscope, surgical instruments, and plastic knee sawbones.

Art: Medical Illustrator, Belinda Klein, instructed students on drawing techniques using a femur and full skeleton. The students learned how to break down complex shapes into smaller, simple shapes to create an image.

Engineering: The students watched a presentation concerning concussions and head injury prevention. After the presentation, they created their own engineered contraptions to protect an egg, which was a simulator for the skull and brain. To test their inventions, one-by-one the students dropped their egg from the second floor. Many inventions were successful in protecting the simulated head and brain.

Math: Instead of the traditional math pathway, we focused on medical numbers including how many bones are in the hand, foot, and entire human body. The students discussed these medical aspects as they assemble and label a full skeleton.

After the STEAM Stations, the students ate lunch and then learned about PT as a career and watched dry needling demonstration. During the last section of the day's program, the students enjoyed more hands-on medical techniques by practicing suturing techniques using pig's feet and administering IVs into arm simulators.





During this time, he completed his Bachelor of Science at Georgia State University in Atlanta and went on to earn a Master of Education focusing on Instructional Technology from Georgia College and State University. Jimmy then earned his Doctor of Philosophy in Workforce Education from the University of Georgia.

This love of learning continued as Dr. Colquitt went back to earn other credentials including his Emergency Medical Technician license and certifications in simulation operations (CHSOS) and simulation education (CHSE). In addition, Dr. Colquitt has earned the status of a Senior Educator through the American College of Surgeons and TeamSTEPPS Master Trainer through the American Hospital Association. During this time, Jimmy also discovered his passion for teaching through simulation and games. He focuses his research on building ad hoc medical teams to deliver care during emergencies and on improving patient safety through better communication and collaboration.

In the current chapter of Dr. Colquitt's career, he has served as the Director of Graduate Medical Education and Designated Institutional Official at HCA Coliseum Medical Centers in Macon, where he picked up two new residencies and led the establishment of two more. He has served as the director of simulation-based education and continues to work on developing the simulation programs across all three Mercer campuses and the communities therein.

Most recently Dr. Colquitt was appointed as Interim Associate Dean for Academic Affairs for MUSM, where he works to accomplish the mission of Mercer by expanding the medical education program into the rural areas of Georgia and enhance the training to ultimately improve patient care in rural areas of Georgia.
